Teaching and Learning



At Meriden Church of England Primary School, through an ethos underpinned by the Christian faith and values, we provide the children with a curriculum which is broad and well balanced, encouraging all pupils to live safe, active and healthy lives. Through practical and appropriate learning experiences, we nurture pupils' sense of curiosity, enquiry, awe and wonder. We promote high expectations and expect pupils to have pride in themselves as learners.



Throughout their time at Meriden, pupils' literacy and numeracy skills are developed across the curriculum, as well as vocabulary, communication and social skills. Pupils' artistic and creative talents are valued and promoted alongside design and IT skills; key to life in a fast paced technological society.

By the end of year 6, our pupils, regardless of gender, ability, social background or ethnicity, will have had the experiences needed to develop the academic skills, social, moral and cultural awareness that will enable them be successful lifelong learners, both in secondary school and further into adult life.

Inclusion

We are totally committed to providing high quality provision and support for all pupils. We recognise that all children are individuals with their own specific needs, gifts and talents.

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities

We are a very inclusive school and modify tasks where needed to ensure that all children can access the curriculum and achieve their full potential. Children may be included on the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities register and may have a Needs Based Plan which sets targets and outlines actions to support them. Where appropriate, a referral to an external support agency may be made. We support children and parents in addressing behaviour issues and will put strategies in place to support children in gaining the skills to

manage and be responsible for their own behaviour. Above all, we want to raise the self-esteem of all our children and give them the skills to enjoy life in and out of school.

More Able Children

Children who are identified as being exceptionally able or talented are supported in various ways. They are challenged academically and provided with stimulating and enriching lessons appropriate for their need. Themed weeks enable children to develop a wider knowledge in subject areas such as Science and Technology and participation in intra school and inter school competitions showcases individual sporting talents. Our pupils also have the opportunity to work alongside talented pupils from other schools as part of our curriculum provision.

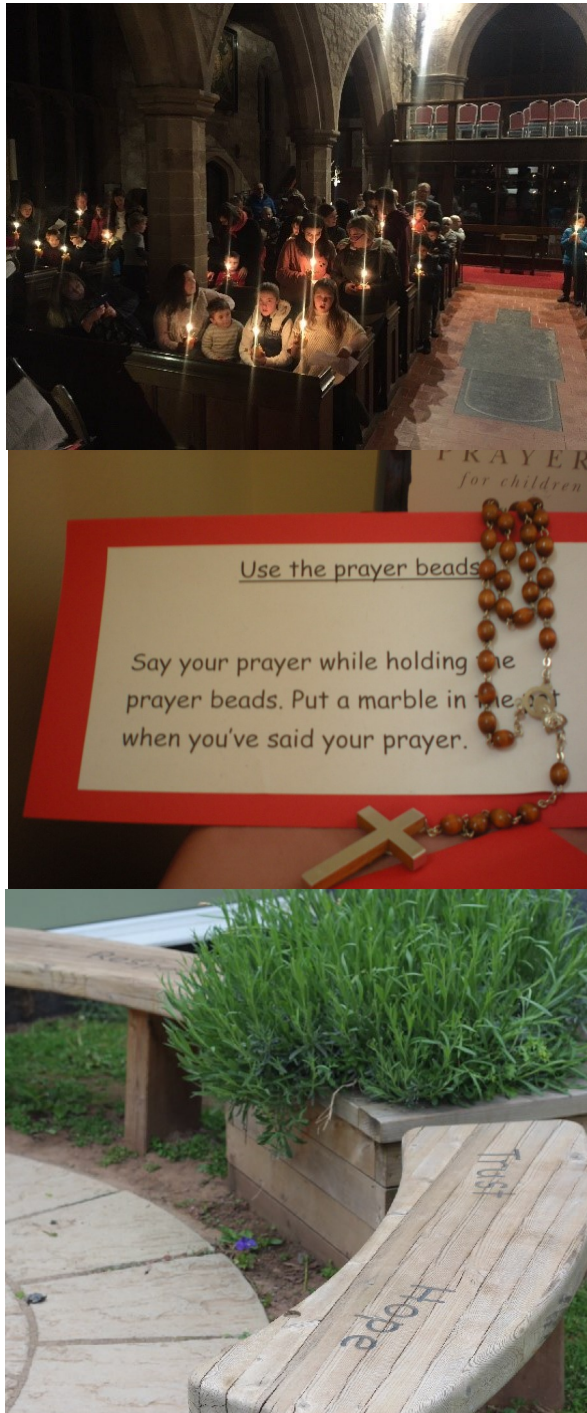
Our Christian Values

Meriden school strives to be a family community that seeks to develop all children spiritually and morally through mutual respect and understanding.

We have close links with the local community, inviting parents, Church and village groups and relevant organisations to join and lead Worship with us.

Collective Worship is at the heart of our life as a Church of England School. It is an engaging and fulfilling part of school life. Recognising the innate spirituality that all children possess, we seek to support our children in their own capacities for, and sense of, true awe and wonder. We seek to encourage them to contemplate the existence of God in order to respond, from their own level of understanding and belief, to any offering, be it through prayer, song or drama.

Religious Education is a stimulating and an important part of the curriculum at Meriden CE Primary School where it has a particularly significant part to play in the social, moral, spiritual and cultural development of our children.

Although Christianity has a central place in the curriculum, in keeping with our historic foundation and strong Christian ethos, it is important in our changing society that children learn to understand, appreciate and respect the traditions, beliefs and practices of other faiths; and to respect the rights of others who hold different beliefs from their own. Our children are

encouraged to share their own experiences with others and to develop their understanding of and sensitivity towards those of other faiths and those of no faith.

Typical lessons are engaging and stimulating where teachers endeavour to cater for the range of learning styles. The school has active links with the Diocese of Coventry and our Meriden Parish Church of St. Laurence where a number of school services and learning experiences take place during the year, including, the annual End of Year Leavers Service, Christingle, Harvest and Easter.

We believe that a good partnership between school and home is essential and have an ‘open door’ policy where parents can speak to staff before or after school or arrange an appointment if necessary. Parents are encouraged to comment in their child’s reading record or homework diary.

Parents and other family members are welcomed into school every half term to work alongside their child and see what it is like to be a pupil at Meriden!

Parents are welcome to volunteer in school either as a regular commitment or supporting specific activities.

We have two parents’ evenings throughout the year and regular open sessions where children can share their work with parents. Written reports are sent home at the end of each term and parents are welcome to come and discuss these.

The newsletter comes out every Friday and is available on our website. It contains updates, reports about events in school and information about trips, visitors and events in school.

Parents are also welcome to attend our Friday Celebration Assembly where certificates are awarded for good behaviour and hard work and birthdays are celebrated.

Fundraising

The school organises regular social and fund raising events for both children and families. Events have included quizzes and highly successful fairs.

Recently, donations from parents have helped us to purchase 40 iPads and 40 laptops for the children to use across the whole school as well as the trim trail.



Governors

The Governing Body consists of representatives of parents, teachers, members of the local community including the church and the Local Authority. They work closely with the staff and Senior Leadership Team to support the school and plan strategic developments. Our Governing Body is very actively involved in all aspects of school life.



Clubs and Activities

We have a spacious hall and grounds which are used for PE activities within the curriculum and after school clubs and activities.

Pupils have the opportunity to take peripatetic music lessons during the school day. These include brass, string, piano and woodwind.

School Council

Each Year the children elect representatives for the School Council. The School Council is actively involved in developing different aspects of school life. Amongst other things, the School Council has been responsible for changing from trays to plates and bowls at dinnertimes, choosing playground equipment, introducing girls football and fund raising for charities and playground markings in school as well as having an input into the Behaviour and Anti-Bullying policies.



Eco Club

Pupils are the driving force behind Eco-Schools – they lead an Eco-Committee and help to audit the environmental performance of the school. In conjunction with the rest of the school and the wider community, it's the pupils that decide the environmental themes they want to address and how they're going to do it. Eco team get involved in the community by planting in the village, entering national competitions; we recently won Gold for our Hanging Basket in the Gardener's World Show!





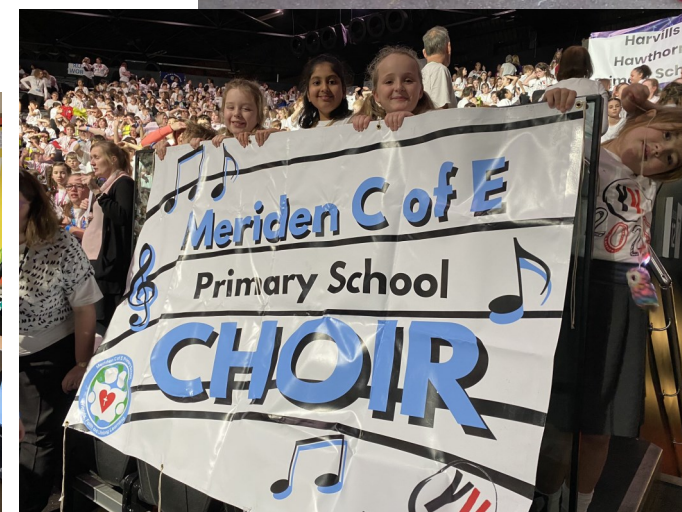
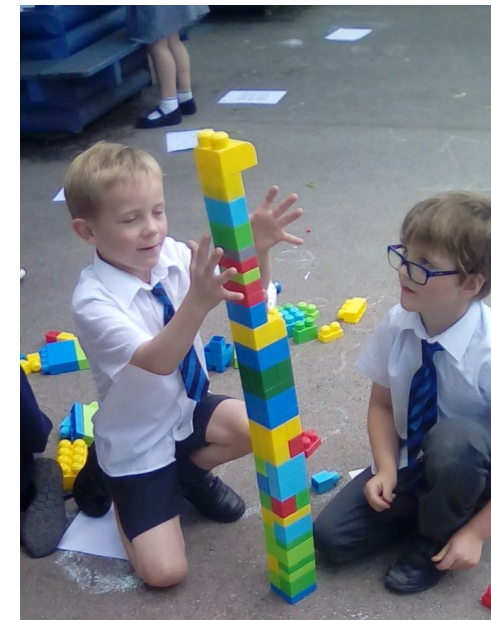
A Curriculum for all

We adopt a topic based approach to learning. Topics are usually taught for a half term or term and they are built around the interests of the class – in fact the children help plan and shape their learning so they are always keen to work! They cover a number of curriculum areas and often involve trips and visitors. In addition we hold specific themed days and weeks such as Health & Safety, Creative, Anti-Bullying and Faith weeks where the whole school is involved.

Frequently Asked Questions

Here are our answers, to what we find are the most frequently asked questions. If you have any questions that are not answered here, please contact the school office on 01676 522488 and we will be happy to help!

Health at school

The school is always willing to discuss any concerns a parent may have about a child's health and assist in arranging for a visit by the school nurse. At times, the school will give information to parents regarding health issues.

Illness in school

If a child becomes ill or injured during the day, the parents/carers will be contacted immediately and given details. The parents will be expected to make arrangements for the child to be collected as soon as possible. A child who has vomited or had a bout of diarrhoea, must not return to school for at least 48 hours, to ensure the illness has passed, before coming into contact with other children.

Medicines at school

We can only administer medicines that have been prescribed by a doctor. Children are expected to self-administer daily medication for medical conditions such as inhalers for asthma. All medicine must be clearly labelled with the child's name, dosage and clear instructions. All inhalers are stored in an accessible asthma box and parents/carers must notify the school if their child needs to use one.

Child too ill to attend?

If your child is unwell, contact the school absence line by 9.00 am stating the

child's name, class and the reason for absence. The absence line is 01676 522488 and is open for 24 hours.

Attendance and punctuality

It is very important that children attend school and are on the premises before 9:00 am. Latecomers miss instructions and disturb other children who are settled into their work. Likewise, it is essential that children are collected promptly and that you contact the school if there is any unexpected change to the arrangements. It is the parents' responsibility to ensure their child attends school every day, unless the child is unwell. We monitor each child's attendance closely and the Education Welfare Officer will be informed if punctuality or attendance is not satisfactory and further action may be taken.

Authorised absence

Authorisation of absence will not be given for outings, holidays or family visits. Holidays must be taken during school holidays.

Jewellery

Children are permitted to wear stud earrings, however in P.E. lessons these must be taken out or tape placed over them.

Hair

Please ensure that long hair is tied back.

Uniform

Foundation Stage children only

School sweatshirt (with logo)

School navy polo shirt (with logo)

FS1—Navy joggers or shorts

FS2—Plain grey school trousers, shorts, skirt or pinafore dress

Children in Years 1 - 6

Plain navy v-neck jumper, sweatshirt, cardigan or tank top

White shirt (long or short sleeved)

School tie (elasticated ties may be worn by children in year 1 and 2 only)

Plain grey school trousers, skirt or pinafore dress

All children

Grey or white socks / white, grey or navy tights

Black or navy shoes – NOT boots (no high heels)

In summer - blue & white checked dress

Sensible sandals (no high heels)

Any coloured plain hair ornaments.

Outdoors; Sensible warm coat

PE kit – all children (FS2-Year 6)

Plain T-shirt in house colour

Plain navy shorts (NOT Lycra/ cycling shorts) or skirt or skort

Black plimsolls (indoors) or trainers (outdoors)

During cold weather pupils may wear track suits, preferably in navy or black



Phones and iPods

We do not encourage children to bring phones to school. However if a phone is essential and the Headteacher has given permission for it to be brought to school, it must be left at the school office. iPods and other expensive items are not permitted in school as we cannot ensure their safety.

Pencil cases

Pencil cases are allowed in Key Stage 1 and 2 as we encourage children to become independent.

Parent communications

Weekly newsletters keep you informed of events at the school, and any changes to procedures or policies. At the beginning of the school day it is hard for teachers to talk to parents when they have their whole class so please leave messages for teachers at the school office either in person or by telephone. Appointments can be made to meet with teachers and the senior staff after school. There is an opportunity to meet formally with teachers during open evening to discuss your child's progress and wellbeing. Examples of how we communicate with parents are: weekly newsletters, a school-home text service, a detailed website www.meridenceprimaryschool.co.uk, a home-school agreement, termly curriculum overviews, regular parent workshops, communication between home and school via the reading record book or planner (KS2), a full report of progress for parents about their child at the end of each term.

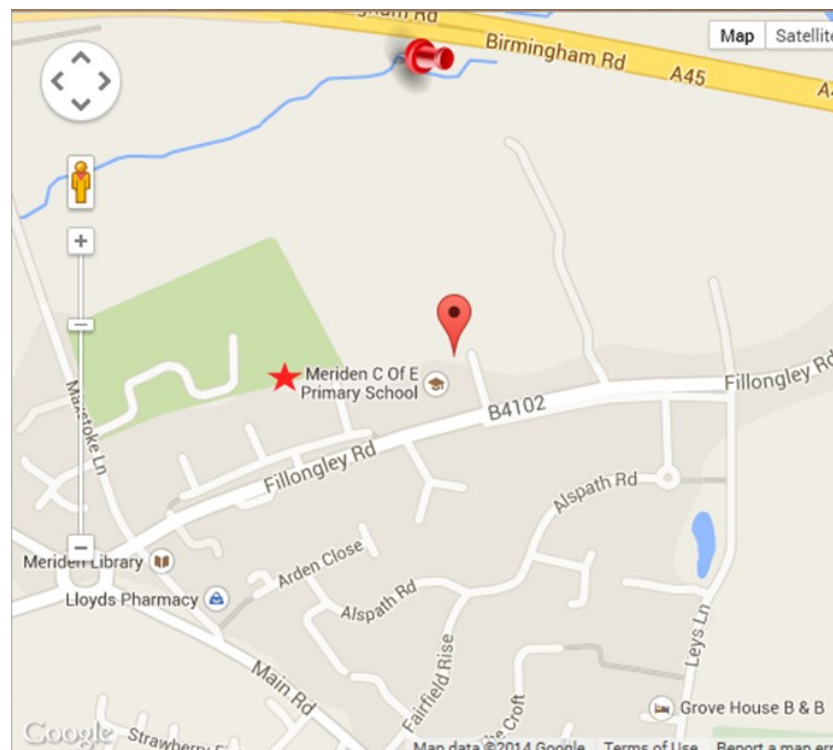


Talk to us!

When parents, students and visitors offer praise, or criticism, we listen carefully. We review all the comments you make and we use that information to improve our services even further. We aim to always pass on any praise to the people concerned, handle complaints in complete confidence, investigate impartially, and offer a clear and complete explanation. Please talk to your child's teacher or teaching assistant if you have a concern about your child and they will act on it. You could also talk to Miss Parker or Mrs Smith in reception and they will help you to raise the issue with the appropriate member of staff as complaints are usually best resolved informally with those responsible.

If you are not satisfied with how your complaint or concern has been dealt with, you should put it in writing and send it to the school. We will then investigate the situation so that we can explain our actions or, apologise and take positive action if necessary. We take all comments and complaints seriously.
